We support proposals to enable parents who want to work to be economically active, whilst ensuring quality childcare to ensure young people have the best start in life. Nevertheless, this priority is focused on a very specific issue and fewer, but more strategic and cross-cutting priorities would provide assurances that Government departments will not be acting in silos, but rather contributing to multiple strategic outcomes. To create a better future for our citizens we need strategic direction on development, climate change and infrastructure, as well as urban and rural sustainable development. There is no reference in the document to Community Planning, which has traditionally been recognised as the local delivery of PfG priorities. This is an unfortunate omission as Community Planning is vital to ensure that the needs of parents/carers and children are met at the local level. The planning system plays an important role in meeting these objectives. Access to a safe, warm home and to green space are particularly important for childhood development; having high access to green space in childhood can reduce the risk of developing mental health diseases later in life by up to 55%, a study by Aarhus University in 2019 found.

The decrease in the quantity and quality of independent play in children has been linked to increased inequality and a looming skill crisis. We would welcome the recognition in the PfG of the importance of play areas for all children, including usable green spaces. Placemaking embeds the provision of quality, well-located and usable green spaces and play areas within developments, including childcare settings, underlining the importance of the planning system to childhood development.

The planning system is also vital to ensuring that goods, services and employment opportunities are located within walking or cycling distance of residential areas, reducing the need for car trips and car ownership, whilst ensuring equality of opportunity for all communities.

The quality of the built environment is a determining factor for mental and physical health, with noise, pollution levels, access to quality green space, services and leisure facilities all playing a part, especially for those who experience barriers because of age, mobility difficulties or neurodiversity (including dementia). Well-planned places, particularly those with access to green infrastructure, support community cohesion and are important for supporting the mental and physical health of residents. Planning decisions can have a positive impact on mental health and wellbeing of all so it is important to support planners and the planning system in Northern Ireland in order to improve our health outcomes via preventative measures.

Creating an accessible, inclusive built environment that enables everyone to play an equal role in society is important in protecting and enhancing the well-being of all communities. The 2020 World Bank Handbook for Gender-Inclusive Planning & Design reported that: 'In general, cities work better for heterosexual, able-bodied, cisgender men than they do for women, girls, sexual and gender minorities, and people with disabilities. Key aspects of the built urban environment – related to access, mobility, safety and freedom from violence, health and hygiene, climate resilience, and security of tenure – create disproportionate burdens for women, girls, and sexual and gender minorities of all ages and abilities, thus exacerbating and reinforcing existing gender inequities".

As planners, we recognise the need to prioritise inclusive design in enhancing our built environment. The planning system presents a crucial opportunity to ensure that our public spaces are futureproofed and resilient against the threat of violence towards women and girls. Public space plays a large role in increasing perceptions of safety and belonging, and planners and the planning system are intrinsic to embedding gender sensitive design.

However, focusing only on safety in urban design further perpetuates limiting views on the experience of women and girls. Women and girls, when surveyed, are as keen to talk about the design of streets and public spaces as they are to discuss provision in parks, biodiversity, opportunities for children to play, the harms caused by high levels of pollution and the fact that they would like greater opportunity to socialise in parks and outdoor spaces. Feeling safe is important, but, perpetuating the narrative that women and girls are potential victims and limiting discussions about gender inclusivity to safety, is missing an opportunity to think about the big picture changes that can happen when places are designed by and for everyone. Gender mainstreaming is an approach to policy-making that takes into account both women's and men's interests and concerns. Gender mainstreaming at policy level through design guidance can, over time, help to shift the culture of a place, the aspiration being to create something new that is of benefit to all people of all backgrounds and genders.

Access to a safe, warm home and to green space are particularly important for childhood development; having high access to green space in childhood can reduce the risk of developing mental health diseases later in life by up to 55%, a study by Aarhus University in 2019 found.

The decrease in the quantity and quality of independent play in children has been linked to increased inequality and a looming skills crisis. We would welcome the recognition in the PfG of the importance of play areas for all children, including usable green spaces. Placemaking embeds the provision of quality, well-located and usable green spaces and play areas within developments, underlining the importance of the planning system to childhood development.

In addition, the requirement for Changing Places in all new major publicly accessible buildings such as shopping centres, leisure centres and sports venues is very important to give dignity to older children and young adults and support their parents/carers.

Housing investment is to be welcomed, and more direction is needed on the provision of affordable housing as well as social housing. As noted elsewhere in the document, house building will be restricted without the appropriate infrastructure to support it. This includes funding for affordable

homes, a solution to the NI Water capacity issue, and a properly resourced planning system. Consideration must also be given to creating communities with access to daily services and affordable, accessible transport to connect to amenities and employment opportunities. It is important that quality places are created in well-connected, sustainable locations, rather than simply a focus on the number of homes.

The planning system is intrinsic to the delivery of more social, affordable and sustainable housing. Emerging LDPs provide the longer-term tool to ensure homes are delivered in the right places, with the right infrastructure to support them. Planners are vital to ensure the delivery of housing which is well connected with access to vital goods and services, as well as open spaces. Housing cannot be delivered in isolation. In addition, planners are also vital in ensuring the protection and promotion of the historic environment in any development scheme.

The environmental priority is disappointing in that the wording suggests that it focusses only on Lough Neagh and not on wider ambitions such as tackling the climate and nature crises across our nation. Whilst Lough Neagh is important and the recent Action Plan is welcomed, the priority should be wider than the (important) single issue of Lough Neagh. More emphasis needs to be placed on the nature crisis and the biodiversity crisis in Northern Ireland.

RTPI NI would encourage the government to pursue a place-based and ecosystems-based approach, rather than a sectoral one, where policies relating to climate action and adaptation are integrated into land use policies and development decisions, as well as investment decisions, and behaviour change of all individuals in society towards sustainable choices is encouraged through the creation of environments that encourage low carbon lifestyles.

While some areas of reform may be needed, the three key issues holding back delivery of an effective planning system currently are: a lack of resources, particularly in Local Authorities and statutory consultees, a lack of capital funding to deliver urgently needed social housing, and a lack of capital funding to address the NI water infrastructure capacity issue. Unless all three of those issues are addressed, the priorities for Government will not be delivered.

Planning plays an essential role in the climate action and sustainability conversation, with its ability to integrate energy, transport and land use planning, encourage sustainable travel, develop the best local solutions to low carbon energy, deliver well located and energy efficient housing, guide investment in integrated blue and green infrastructure and coordinate strategic resilience to the impacts of climate change. RTPI NI believes that there is under resourcing and underfunding of the planning service which often results in planners being unable to meet the current demands placed upon them. The system must have the resources it requires.

Planning policy provides a strong mechanism and guide to managing development, with a place-based approach, ensuring that the local context is considered and opportunities are utilised to ensure maximum benefits for climate mitigation. Research published by the RTPI in March 2021 on Place-Based Approaches to Climate Change showed that a place-based approach is essential to climate action, adaptation and mitigation policies, in order to avoid sectoral thinking and acting in silos, which can have a disproportionately negative impact on some communities. Local Development Plans are a significant opportunity to provide an integrated place-based approach to delivering low carbon energy supplies where the demand and opportunities are. More effective cross scale working between DAERA, Dfl and Local Councils, as well as between Councils and utility providers such as NI Water, is needed to deliver local plans and policies that will support the transition to greener energy sources. This is essential to underpin the Development Management system. In addition, planning and sustainability colleagues need to work together in local authorities to develop strategies and action plans which prioritise a place-based approach.

While welcoming this Programme for Government, there are three key planning-related challenges that will need to be addressed to ensure the objectives can be realised:

- 1. Difficult budget decisions have seen a 38% reduction in the Department for Communities' capital budget in May 2024. Data from the Chartered Institute for Housing suggests that the number of new social homes planned for this year has plummeted by 73%, leaving only 400 new homes in the pipeline;
- 2. Even if more funding for affordable homes were made available, the NI Water infrastructure capacity issue means that some 19,000 'units' (private and social homes plus public and commercial buildings) currently in the planning or construction pipeline are unable to proceed. NI Water itself has advised that even if its April 2021-March 2027 PC21 programme were fully funded, only 4,500 of those 19,000 units could proceed. NI Water's business plan identifies that it needs capital investment of around £2.5bn, including the Living with Water programme;
- 3. Planners and the planning system must be properly resourced to do the job. This includes Council planning departments, statutory consultees, the Department for Infrastructure and the Planning Appeals Commission.
